Flu Reporting: Who, What, When, and Why

The City of Amarillo Department of Public Health monitors and reports the levels of flu in the community. The 2017-2018 flu season has been intense and continues with widespread activity. Who should report?

- Any facility which completes influenza testing and receives results.
- Current reporting forms are available by fax or online here: http://amarillo.gov/home/showdocument?id = 1817

What and When?

- The date tested
- The *county* of the patient who tested positive for flu
 - o The city and state can be reported if the county is unknown
- What the positive result is
 - o Flu A, Flu B, Influenza-like Illness, Undifferentiated Flu
- If the patient was hospitalized or died from flu
- Reporting dates start each Sunday and end each Saturday.

Why should I report?

- Reporting ensures the City of Amarillo Public Health Department can monitor the community effectively for flu outbreaks, and release accurate health alerts if necessary.
- The Texas Department of State Health Services works with the CDC to monitor and track flu numbers for the country to determine the effectiveness of the vaccine. The CDC uses these data to create an appropriate vaccine.

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2017-2018 Flu Season Additional Information

Symptoms and Reporting

- A patient is contagious approximately one day before onset of symptoms and for 3-7 days after symptom onset
- Influenza-like Illness (ILI) is reportable. Case definition:
 - o Fever (≥ 100° F [37.8° C])
 - Cough and/or sore throat
- Even though a rapid flu test may be negative, *please* consider a flu diagnosis if clinical symptoms apply.

Prevention


A recent study suggests flu is spread not only by droplets (e.g. sneezing) and to a lesser degree fomites (inanimate objects which harbor pathogens), but also aerosols – such as breathing. Read the article here: Flu Aerosols

How to avoid getting the flu

- Get a flu vaccine recommended yearly
- Try to avoid close contact with those who are sick
- Cover your cough and sneeze with a tissue or the inside of your elbow
 - o Do not cough or sneeze into your hands or into the air
- Wash your hands often with soap and water

What to do if you are sick

- Speak to your doctor
- Stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone, except to get medical care or necessities
- Take anti-viral medication, as prescribed by your doctor
