B. ORDINANCE NO. 7712:

(Contact: Michael W. Conner, Director of Aviation)

This is the second and final reading of an ordinance for commercial ground vehicle operators at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport (Airport). The City of Amarillo and Department of Aviation propose this ordinance as authorized through the Texas Legislature, Texas Occupations Code Chapter 2402. The proposed ordinance authorizes reasonable fees and regulation on commercial ground vehicle operators, to include Transportation Network Companies (TNCs), e.g., Uber and Lyft. As proposed in the ordinance, the funding mechanism and regulatory

operating standards are focused to accomplish the following objectives: establish uniform commercial ground vehicle operating standards, provide revenues to maintain airport systems that support commercial ground vehicle traffic on the airport, and to compensate the airport for administration and enforcement of the operating standards. The Airport's Rules and Regulations document shall be the guiding standard for commercial ground vehicle operations at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

Agenda Item Summary

The North Heights Neighborhood Plan, adopted by the City Council in January of 2017, identified historic preservation as an important strategy. Specifically, it was outlined as a high priority, short term action in the plan's implementation table, as excerpted below.

As described in the plan, a 1997 Historic Preservation Survey by Hardy-Heck-Moore & Associates identified a total of 109 historically significant buildings, 98 of which were deemed as medium priority and 11 of which were deemed as high priority.


While the Amarillo Code of Ordinances does have a chapter (4-11) on Landmarks and Historic Preservation, it dates back to 1991. It does provide a mechanism for the Zoning Ordinance to be used as a tool to designate a property, or series of properties, as landmarked. However, staff can find no evidence that this mechanism has been utilized, or is effective in any way. It also invites confusion and unnecessary complication in attempting to apply such by using the Planned Development (PD) zoning tool, rather than a simple zoning overlay. While there is language about a tax incentive option, it does not appear to have ever been utilized or advertised.

While a historic preservation strategy is new for the City of Amarillo in terms of proactive pursuit, an initial updating of the ordinance, and a focused rolling out of this ordinance in cooperation with North Heights property owners is an opportunity to both update the city's ordinance while implementing a widely-supported neighborhood plan. It is also a small enough area to be manageable, given the Planning Department's staffing size. Lastly, it would provide an important project for the assigned board to be involved in, as there typically is not a great deal of activity for their hearing and review.

The map on the next page illustrates the identified properties from the 1997 survey. Since the survey is dated, there would need to be some verification of each location's properties and condition, to



determine if the priority level should remain the same.

It is also the subject of a variety of land use guiding principles adopted in this plan, excerpted below.

- Minimize negative effects between incompatible land uses and ensure adequate transitions.
- Distinguish suitable areas for public uses.
- Discourage intense uses within or adjacent to residential areas.
- Diversify the types of commercial activity.
- Limit development in floodplains and environmentally sensitive areas.
- Consider public safety as it relates to future developments.
- Protect and promote areas of historical and cultural significance.
- Avoid creating undesirable precedents.
- Ensure consistency of land use decisions on similar properties.



- Advance development that serves the needs of a diverse population.
- Promote redevelopment and infill that meets community needs and is complimentary to the neighborhood.
- Enhance neighborhood identity and investment where possible.

In the time since the completion and adoption of this plan, Planning Department staff has been working to identify and pinpoint where conflicts between the current land uses, current zoning, and future land use (outlined in the Comprehensive Plan and Future Land Use & Character (FLUC)map) currently exist. As part of this exercise, there are a great number of areas where city-initiated rezoning could proactively address in part inconsistencies in zoning, conflicts and lack of transitions, and prevent intensive uses in areas where the current neighborhood would not benefit from them.

In preparing for this item, staff has been unable to locate any records of city-initiated rezoning efforts in Amarillo, though the Local Government Code gives cities this authority in Chapter 211. While this would be a process that would take some time, it is an effort which directly ties to the success of the North Heights planning effort. Each rezoning request would follow the same steps as any owner-initiated rezoning request. Staff would make efforts to contact every property owner and explain the process, the desired outcomes, and answer all questions.





The invocation was given by Sarah Stevens, First Baptist Church. Councilmember Smith led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Nelson established a quorum, called the meeting to order, welcomed those in attendance and the following items of business were conducted:

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Kip Billups, 3001 Southwest 58th Avenue, #506, stated he only signed up for a spot for someone else. Amanda Brown, 810 Southwest 14th Avenue, spoke on homelessness. She asked that Christ Church Camp be allowed to continue. She stated the City should stress the importance of every life. Edith DiTommaso, 1613 Bowie, #B, stated she attended the meeting last Thursday. She stated she believed city laws and ordinances needed to be followed but she believed tent city was formed in good faith. She further requested a tiny home village be built. Rusty Tomlinson, 5700 Canyon Drive, stated an ordinance is being enforced to protect property values. He further stated there needed to be a balance between investors and the smallest person in Amarillo. He said Council has the power to ignore ordinances and a need to find a way to delay enforcement until the ordinance can be repealed. Amanda Hunter, 4849 Mesquite Springs Trail, spoke on the Christ Church Camp which she said provided food, clothing and shelter. She stated this was a community and a family for many the residents. She asked for assistance on a low barrier shelter. Susan Barros, 409 South Monroe Street, Director of Downtown Women's Center (DWC), noted a hand-up was better than a handout. She stated there were two kinds of homelessness, the unseen homeless and the residents living in tent city which is supporting the chronically homeless and enabling bad choices. She encouraged dependence and not independence. DWC had several workers at the tent city yesterday offering their services, none have come to the center. She further stated there was an inability to follow rules and get clean and sober. Mildred Darton, 2005 Northwest 14th Avenue, stated she was back in Amarillo after working a natural disaster only to come back to a local disaster. She stated she is a member of the North Heights Advisory Committee and she believed every homeless person that wants to be housed can be. She further stated living outdoors is a temporary housing, not necessarily safe, sanitary or stable. Bobby Nixon, Another Chance House, 209 South Jackson Street, spoke from a personal level. He stated 11 year ago he was homeless because of bad choices in his life. He stated he knew he had to improve his quality of life, had to investment in his own recovery. The needed assistance was provided by this community. He further stated he brought himself out of homelessness and that help can be provided by those who want to help themselves. Kit Rudd, 6850 Grande Street, stated he believed there was a lot of misinformation and misguideness. He stated there were problems in the camp, drug addiction, humane trafficking, and problems that cannot be dealt with. He stated there were drug free zones for anyone who needs rehab and ways to get people out of bad circumstances. He stated the community can find places for everyone in that camp and working together we can solve this issue. BF Roberts, 1007 North Hayden Street, expressed some concerns about the homeless. He stated it was a humane problem. He challenged the Council to reconsider their decisions and negotiate help for those less fortunate. Robert Goodrich, 4111 Stony Point, as the President of the Amarillo Lodging Association, inquired about the hotel occupancy revenue bonds. He asked for a delay on Item 2 until Council could speak with the owners of hotels/motels in the city that earn the HOT dollars. There were no further comments.

Agenda Item Summary

The City of Amarillo and Department of Aviation propose an Ordinance, as authorized through the Texas Legislature, Texas Occupations Code Chapter 2402. The proposed Ordinance authorizes reasonable fees and regulation on commercial ground vehicle operators, to include Transportation Network Companies (TNCs), e.g., Uber and Lyft. As proposed in the Ordinance, the funding mechanism and regulatory operating standards are focused to accomplish the following objectives: establish uniform commercial ground vehicle operating standards, provide revenues to maintain airport systems that support commercial ground vehicle traffic on the airport, and to compensate the airport for administration and enforcement of the operating standards. The Airport's Rules and Regulations document shall be the guiding standard for commercial ground vehicle operations at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

Requested Action

To complete the first reading of the Commercial Ground Vehicle Ordinance and receive continued public input and open dialog on the proposed Ordinance.

Funding Summary

Upon adoption of the Ordinance, the Department of Aviation will propose an industry standard fee to be applied to any fare originating from the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

There is no cost to the City for adopting this Ordinance.

Community Engagement Summary

Level 3- High impact on selected area and/or community group. Airport staff provided a stakeholder invitation using the most current Vehicle for Hire Permit information, maintained by Amarillo Police Department for the City of Amarillo. This stakeholder invitation was postmarked Friday, December 29, 2017 ahead of the general press release published Friday, January 12, 2018 and concluded with a public meeting held on Thursday, January 18, 2018. Upon the conclusion of the public meeting, the Airport provided formal written response to each question submitted. Written responses to questions received were completed Monday, January 29, 2018 and emailed using the contact information provided on the Public Meeting Sign-In sheet.



Staff Recommendation

Airport staff recommends proceeding with the first reading of the proposed Commercial Ground Vehicle Ordinance for the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS: AMENDING THE AMARILLO MUNICIPAL CODE, CHAPTER 16-2, ARTICLE IV, ADDING SECTION 16-2-69 CONCERNING TRANSPORTATION NETWORK COMPANIES; SETTING RULES, REGULATIONS, FEES, AND PENALTIES FOR GROUND TRANSPORTATION COMPANIES AND TRANSPORTATION NETWORK COMPANIES OPERATING AT THE RICK HUSBAND AMARILLO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR REPEALER; PROVIDING FOR CONTINUATION OF PRIOR LAW; PROVINDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature recently amended the Texas Occupations Code adding Chapter 2402 authorizing an airport owner to impose regulations, including reasonable fees, on transportation network companies (that provide digitally prearranged rides to or from the airport) that operate ground transportation businesses on an airport; and

WHEREAS, the City of Amarillo owns and operates Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport; and

WHEREAS, the City of Amarillo desires to regulate ground transportation at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport for the purpose of ensuring commercial ground vehicle operating standards for airport customers, to provide revenues to maintain airport systems that support commercial ground vehicle traffic on the airport, and to compensate the airport for administration and enforcement of the operating standards; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that ensuring commercial ground vehicle operating standards, providing for revenues to maintain airport systems that support commercial ground vehicle traffic, and providing for the compensation for the airport to administer and enforce the operating standards at the airport are in the best interest of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 16-2, Article IV, Section 16-2-69 is hereby added to read as follows:

Sec. 16-2-69. – Airport Ground Transportation Regulations and Fees.

<u>The City hereby adopts the following regulations to apply to any and all commercial</u> ground transportation operators operating at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport:

(a) The City of Amarillo shall have the right and authority to impose fees upon taxi

- cab company operators, limousine company operators, and any other commercial
- ground transportation company operators for the right to operate at the Rick
- Husband Amarillo International Airport.
- (b) The City of Amarillo shall have the right and authority to impose fees upon off-

airport hotel shuttle bus operators and off-airport rental car shuttle bus operators

for the right to operate at the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

(c) All fees imposed on Transportation Network Companies, taxi cab company operators, limousine company operators, other commercial ground transportation company operators, off-airport hotel shuttle bus operators, or off-airport rental car shuttle bus operators shall be approved by the Amarillo City Council.

(d) Except as directed under Texas State Law, the established Airport Rules and Regulations shall govern the administration, enforcement, and operating standards for Commercial Ground Vehicle Operators.

Secs. 16-2-6970-16-2-80. - Reserved.

SECTION 2. Severability. If any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances for any reason is held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid or for any reason unenforceable, the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or the application thereby shall remain in effect, it being the intent of the City Council of the City of Amarillo, Texas in adopting this ordinance, that no portion thereof or provision contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by any reasons of unconstitutionality of any other portion or provision.

SECTION 3. Repealer. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of conflict with this ordinance.

SECTION 4. Continuation. That nothing in this ordinance or any code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding ending in any court or an administrative proceeding, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed by this ordinance.

SECTION 5. Penalty. A violation of this ordinance is an offense punishable in accordance with Section 1-1-5 of this code of ordinances, except as provided in Section 1 [Sec. 8-2-9 (e)(3)] and Section 6.

SECTION 6. Publishing and Effective Date. This ordinance shall be published and become effective according to law.

Consideration and possible action on an ordinance approving the vacation of 80' ROW known as South Monroe Street between Block 192 and Block 193 in Plemons Unit No. 1 and the southern 14' of 80' ROW known as Southwest 14th Avenue located along Block 192 in Plemons Unit No. 1, both in Section 170, Block 2, AB&M Survey, Potter County, Texas. This vacation was reviewed and recommended for approval by a 5:0 vote from the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Agenda Item Summary

This requested vacation is for the purpose of removing the right of way to make way for the church building expansion that will be eventually encroaching that right of way if it were still there in the future. This vacation also makes way to creating a unified building site so that the rezoning, Downtown Urban Design Standard (DAUDS) process, and site plan review easier. Construction plans have been approved and surety provided to relocate utilities at the cost of the developer.

Planning, Utilities, and Engineering Departments have reviewed the vacation and associated dedication to conclude that a later proposed dedication would suffice for proper utility services and maintenance.

Per Section 12, "Dedications and Vacations" of the City of Amarillo's Development Policy Manual, the developer is required to pay the fair market value of the "use" of the land, since the ownership still resides with the city, the applicant paid the valuation of \$8,800 to the city. The bricks in the street are to be recycled through the city's Street Department.

Requested Action

The Comprehensive Plan states that the character and intensity of this land use category encompasses a broad range of commercial and retail uses. Including but not limited to automotive workshop which falls under commercial uses and is thus allowable in General Commercial (GC).

The Neighborhood Unit Concept (NUC) is also a key piece of the adopted plan, in which zoning transitions from areas of lower density at section line corners to areas of high density. This concept does follow the Neighborhood Unit Concept as this request is part of a larger LC zoned area that starts at the section line arterial intersection (Wolflin Avenue & South Georgia Street) where commercial and retail uses are highly recommended. 





ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS: AMENDING THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, CHAPTER 2-4, ARTICLE I, BY ADDING SEC. 2-4-10 "TIME LIMITS FOR RESPONDING TO CERTAIN REQUESTS" ESTABLISHING MONTHLY AND ANNUAL TIME LIMITS ON TIME SPENT BY CITY PERSONNEL ON RESPONDING TO A REQUESTOR OF PUBLIC INFORMATION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR REPEALER; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, during the 85th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature, the Texas Legislature passed H.B. 3107 amending the Public Information Act (Chapter 552 of the Texas Government Code) to allow governmental entities to establish reasonable monthly and yearly limits on the amount of time that personnel of the governmental entity is required to spend producing public information for inspection or duplication by a requestor, or providing copies of public information to a requestor, without recovering its costs attributable to that personnel time;

WHEREAS, harassing, repetitive, and redundant public information requests asking for a large amount of information (known as "vexatious requests") can impose great financial and time burdens on the City, as vexatious requests typically require City personnel to divert their time spent on normal tasks to locate, compile, and reproduce the requested information; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Amarillo, Texas, finds it to be in the public interest to amend Chapter 2-4, Article I of the Municipal Code of the City of Amarillo to establish reasonable monthly and yearly limits on the amount of time that City personnel is required to spend producing public information for inspection or duplication by a Requestor, or providing copies of public information to a Requestor, without recovering the City's costs attributable to that personnel time;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: Chapter 2-4, Article I is hereby amended by adding Section 2-4-10 "Time Limits for Responding to Certain Requests" to read as follows:

Sec. 2-4-10. – Time Limits for Responding to Certain Requests.

(a) <u>Annual Time Limit</u>. Pursuant to Texas Government Code sec. 552.275(a) and (b), thirty-six (36) hours is the reasonable limit on the amount of time that personnel of the City are required to spend producing public information for inspection or duplication by a Requestor or providing copies of public information to a Requestor in any given twelve-month period commencing on October 1 of each year, without recovering the City's costs attributable to that personnel time.

(b) <u>Monthly Time Limit.</u> Pursuant to Texas Government Code sec. 552.275(a) and (b), fifteen (15) hours is the reasonable limit on the amount of time that personnel of the City are required to spend producing public information for inspection or duplication by a Requestor or providing copies of public information to a Requestor in any given monthly period commencing on the 1st date of each month, without recovering the City's costs attributable to that personnel time.

(c) <u>Records of Time Spent Fulfilling Requests</u>. The City Secretary or his or her designee shall be responsible for maintaining records of the cumulative amount of personnel time spent complying with requests for public information from each individual Requestor.

(d) <u>Charges for Personnel Time Spent in Excess of Time Limits</u>. Notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, any Requestor of public information will be charged personnel costs in accordance with Texas Government Code sec. 552.275 for all time in excess of thirty-six (36) hours in any given twelve-month period commencing on October 1 of each year or fifteen (15) hours in a given monthly period commencing on the 1st date of each month, spent by personnel of the City in producing public information for inspection or duplication by a Requestor, or providing copies of public information to a Requestor. The City Secretary shall be responsible for providing all notices to the Requestor as required by law, including written statements of accrued time required by Texas Government Code sec. 552.275(e).

(e) <u>"Requestor" Defined</u>. For purposes of this section, "Requestor" shall have the meaning set forth in Texas Government Code sec. 552.003(6).

SECTION 2. Severability. If any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances for any reason is held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid or for any reason unenforceable, the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or the application thereby shall remain in effect, it being the intent of

the City Council of the City of Amarillo, Texas in adopting this ordinance, that no portion thereof or provision contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by any reasons of unconstitutionality of any other portion or provision.

SECTION 3. Repealer. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of conflict with this ordinance.

SECTION 4. Penalty. It is an offense to violate any part of this ordinance, punishable upon conviction in accordance with Section 1-1-5 of the Amarillo Municipal Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 5. Publishing and Effective Date. This ordinance shall be published and become effective according to law.

Agenda Item Summary

The FY18 SHSP grant application for the City of Amarillo will request grant funds to enhance the capabilities of the Amarillo Police Department to respond to incidents locally or regionally in an emergency. Response personnel are requesting the following:

- Amarillo Regional NIBINS Project Part 1: This project would fund the purchase and implementation of the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network. NIBIN is a national database of digital images of spent bullets and cartridge cases found at crime scenes. The closest current NIBIN facilities are in Oklahoma City, OK and Santa Fe, NM. Part 1 is for the acquisition station for NIBIN
- Amarillo Regional NIBINS Project Part 2: Part 2 consists of the analysis station for NIBIN. The project is split into two parts as to give at least part of the project a better chance at being funded, but it is very possible that the entire project is funded.

The FY18 SHSP grant application for the City of Amarillo will request grant funds to enhance the capabilities of the Amarillo Fire Department to respond to incidents locally or regionally in an emergency. Response personnel are requesting the following:

 Amarillo Regional Incident Management Team Project: This project would fund the broad capability to support a Type 3 Incident Management Team (IMT) in the Panhandle. The grand funding would include needed equipment such as a trailer, generators, computers, portable lighting, and training needed for personnel. The Panhandle IMT consists of 48 personnel from 13 response agencies that could deploy and assist in a response capacity to a major incident or disaster in the Panhandle or elsewhere in Texas.
