- Section 8-2-9 Vaccination Tag: Amending requirement for "current" rabies tag to be displayed.
- Section 8-2-10 Dangerous Animals: Limiting veterinarian offices in Potter and Randall Counties where a deemed dangerous animal can be sterilized and establishing an appeal bond.
- Section 8-2-55 Disposition of Unclaimed or Unredeemed Animals: Protect the personal identifying information for adopters, fosters, and rescue organizations to the extent allowed by law.
- Section 8-2-58 Bestiality: New ordinance amendment that will address prohibiting sexual acts towards animals that result in human sexual arousal. It will not impact legitimate practices done at groomers and/or veterinarian offices.

The Animal Management & Welfare Board has considered and unanimously approved the proposed Ordinance amendments on Monday, December 12, 2016. Their action and recommendation is provided to the City Council in support of this item. Dogs and cats shall at all times wear the <u>current</u> rabies vaccination tag issued to that Animal. The Owner or person in possession of a Miniature pig may not keep such Animal within the City of Amarillo without being able to provide proof of vaccination required by this chapter.

(1) Authority to transfer ownership. The Animal Management & Welfare Department may transfer ownership of any impounded Animal that is unclaimed or unredeemed. In the event of such transfer of ownership, the person or agency to whom ownership is transferred shall pay for such Animal's food and care while in the Animal shelter and shall comply with the applicable vaccination and implanted microchip provisions.

(2) Right to destroy. The Animal Management & Welfare Department may humanely destroy any impounded Animal that is unclaimed or unredeemed.



The Animal Management & Welfare Department may transfer any impounded Animal that is unclaimed and unredeemed to the Amarillo Panhandle Humane Society for the purposes of temporary foster care or adoption. In the event of transfer of ownership for purposes of adoption, the Amarillo Panhandle Humane Society shall pay to the Animal Management & Welfare Department the required fees set forth in this chapter. Except as otherwise required by law, personal identifying information of a person whom adopts or fosters an animal or a rescue organization that takes custody of an animal shall remain confidential.

Agenda Item Summary

This tract of land is currently zoned Manufactured Home District (MH), and the area dates back to 12/21/1925 when it was annexation number 4 (Ordinance 454).

Staff's analysis of zoning changes requests begins with referring to the Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use and Character Map in order to identify what it recommends for future land uses. Staff also considers how any zoning change would impact the Comprehensive Plan's adopted Neighborhood Unit Concept (NUC) of development - whereby non-residential land uses are encouraged at section-line arterial intersections with a transition to residential uses as development occurs away and inward from the arterial intersections. Staff also considers the principles and recommendations laid out within the Comprehensive Plan, as well as existing zoning and development patterns in the area. Lastly, in this case, staff considers compliance with the recently-adopted North Heights Neighborhood Plan.

- Consistency with the Future Land Use and Character (FLUC) map: This zoning request is consistent with the FLUC (Future Land Use & Character) map that was established in 2010. The requested MF-1 zoning does encompass uses consistent with the "General Residential" land use category; that is, residential uses with a mix of housing types and varying densities.
- Consistency with the Neighborhood Unit Concept (NUC): These residential lots located close to the center of the section map label N-10.
- Consistency with the Comprehensive Plan's principles & recommendations: Continued attention to housing affordability, especially for first-time homebuyers and the ongoing need for neighborhood reinvestment and revitalization in north/northeast Amarillo (Comprehensive Plan 6.4).
- Consistency with existing zoning & development patterns: When performing a site visit, staff noticed residential uses in all directions around the vacant two lots. Specifically, single-family homes across the street from the properties for consideration are present, with manufactured homes (single-wides) nearby. There also happen to be many duplexes to the north of these properties located one street north along NW 15th Avenue (zoned R-3). This requested zoning would be a logical continuation of this land use, which is already established in this area. This area was originally platted in May



1903 with a clear residential intent, including an alley and many 50x140' lots.

- Consistency with the North Heights Neighborhood Plan: This rezoning is also consistent with the strategies implemented by the approved North Heights Neighborhood Plan, adopted on 1/10/2017, which supports the creation of high quality, well maintained, mixed income housing that accommodates families and individuals. This proposal also supports redevelopment of vacant and unused properties, as the plan calls for. It is also consistent in the context of the "land use guiding principles" adopted as part of the North Heights Neighborhood Plan. These principles focus on the health, stability, and functionality of the North Heights neighborhood area while ensuring consistency in decision making. Specifically, the following principles support this application:
- Determine that the decision will not create an arbitrary development pattern.
- Plan for an adequate and diverse supply of housing for all income levels.
- Ensure consistency of land use decisions on similar properties.
- Promote redevelopment and infill that meets community needs and is complimentary to the neighborhood.

In summary, the application is consistent with the FLUC map, the Comprehensive Plan, the zoning & development patterns of the area, and the North Heights Neighborhood Plan, justifying a recommendation of approval.

The applicant is requesting the zoning of 0.32 acres tract of land, previously zoned Manufactured Home District (MH), to change to Multiple Family District 1 (MF-1), in order to build residential duplexes.





WHEREAS, references to City Commission instead of City Council remain in the Municipal Code of Ordinances and should be changed to reflect the City Charter, as amended November 5, 2013.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. The Amarillo Municipal Code, Title II, Section 2-2-1 be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-2-1 - Regular and Special Meetings

(a) The City Council shall hold regular meetings on Tuesday of each week at the regular meeting place of the City Council, unless otherwise determined by the City Council.

(e) Proceedings of the City Council shall be governed by and conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order, as modified by the City Council, unless in

conflict with this Section or with applicable state law.

(g) All meetings of the City Council shall be held in compliance with the Texas Open Meetings Act, as now or hereafter amended.

SECTION 2. The Amarillo Municipal Code be and hereby is amended to change all

references to "City Commission" to "City Council" in accordance with the City Charter, as amended

November 5, 2013.

SECTION 3. Severability. If any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or the

application of same to any person or set of circumstances for any reason is held to be

unconstitutional, void or invalid or for any reason unenforceable, the validity of the remaining

portions of this ordinance or the application thereby shall remain in effect, it being the intent of the

City Council of the City of Amarillo, Texas in adopting this ordinance, that no portion thereof or

provision contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by any reasons of unconstitutionality of

any other portion or provision.

SECTION 4. Repealer. All ordinances, parts of ordinances resolutions and parts of

resolutions in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of conflict with this

ordinance.

SECTION 5. Continuation. That nothing in this ordinance (or any code adopted herein)

shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or

liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance

hereby repealed by this ordinance and such prior law is continued in effect for purposes of such

pending matter.

SECTION 6. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its

passage.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO: SUPPORTING PROPOSED 2017 LEGISLATION TO AMEND CHAPTER 372, LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE, TO ENABLE THE CREATION OF A LOCAL TOURISM IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT IN AMARILLO

WHEREAS, Chapter 372, Local Government Code, currently allows for the creation of a Tourism Public Improvement District in the Cities of Dallas, San Antonio, Austin, Fort Worth and Arlington; and

WHEREAS, the City of Dallas Tourism Public Improvement District was initiated in 2012, and has proven to be a success; and

WHEREAS, Amarillo does not have statutory authority to consider creation of a Tourism Public Improvement District; and

WHEREAS, the hoteliers within the City and Amarillo Visitors Council have unanimously pledged support of creation of an Amarillo Tourism Public Improvement District; and

WHEREAS, if the Texas Legislature passes enabling legislation, a Tourism Public Improvement District could be created only if it is first requested by a petition signed by over sixty percent (60%) of the hotels that would be included within the District, and after public hearings and a majority vote of approval by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, incorporating this item into the City of Amarillo's Legislative Agenda for the 2017 Texas Legislative Session would not obligate the Council to create a Tourism Public Improvement District, but would engender greater municipal authority with respect to public improvement districts.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. The City Council hereby endorses and supports approval of legislation to be presented to the 2017 Texas Legislature, which would amend Chapter 372 of the Local Government Code to enable the City of Amarillo to create a Tourism Public Improvement District.

SECTION 2. That this Resolution shall be effective on and after its adoption. INTRODUCED AND PASSED this 14^{th} day of March 2017.

This resolution and public hearing considers ordering the removal of substandard structures located at 1600 S Palo Duro Street.

Agenda Item Summary

This item is the public hearing to determine if the property at 1600 S Palo Duro Street which consists of a fire damaged single family residence, a detached accessory structure and an accumulation of solid waste constitutes a public nuisance and thereby declared as dangerous structures and order the removal of such structures and accumulations.

Requested Action

Adopt the resolution declaring that certain improvements described herein are a public nuisance, and requiring the taking down and removal of such improvements and accumulations.

Funding Summary

The property owner is responsible to pay all costs associated with the Dangerous Structure process and to abate any nuisances. The property owner will be billed for costs incurred. However, this property is in the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) target area and if the owner qualifies, CDBG funding may be utilized to pay invoiced costs.

Community Engagement Summary

- A citizen's complaint was received.
- A Building Safety Inspector identified the dangerous structures. Posted the property as unsafe.
- Initiated the Dangerous Structure process.
- The Amarillo Police Department has been called out to this location 5 times since July 2013 (4 years).
- Safety and aesthetics of the community as identified through public meetings in the development of Amarillo's Comprehensive Plan.

Staff Recommendation

It is the staff's recommendation to adopt the resolution declaring certain improvements are public nuisances and requiring the taking down and removal thereof.

WHEREAS, this Council finds that the notice of the Building Official to make the structure safe either by repair or demolition and removal has not been complied with; and,

WHEREAS, this Council finds that the notice of the Building Official to remove rubbish, trash, solid waste and/or unsanitary matter has not been complied with;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AMARILLO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds that the alleged nuisance condition, address thereof, the legal description of same, and the Interested Persons are as follows:



<u>NATURE OF NUISANCE</u>: This property consists of a fire damaged residential structure and an accessory building. The structures are unsecured and open. Little effort has been made to abate the hazards. It is an attractive nuisance to the neighborhood and is considered to be a fire, health and safety hazard.

SECTION 2. This Council hereby finds the Interested Persons failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the Initial Notice of violation to repair or rehabilitate; or to demolish the Dangerous Structure or portion thereof; or, to timely and substantially complete the terms of a Provisional Permit and determines that each of the improvements, buildings and structures described herein are dangerous structures, are structurally unsafe, constitute a fire hazard and are dangerous to human life, and their continued use will constitute a hazard to the safety, health and public welfare and each are hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

SECTION 3. This Council has deliberated its decision, giving due consideration to and weighing the following factors: validity of the violations as alleged by the Building Official; the severity of such violations and any corresponding danger to the public; due regard for private property rights; fair opportunity for the Interested Persons to have been notified of the problems and a corresponding opportunity to repair, remediate, or remove the defects or Dangerous Structure; weighing the private property interests of neighbors affected by further delay or deterioration of the subject property; and any other relevant consideration unique to the circumstances of this case which may materially affect due process and equal protection of involved persons.

SECTION 4. This Council now finds that a public nuisance exists, and has not been timely abated, and now issues the following order(s):



good cause exists to defer the adjudication of the case and directing reinstatement or extension of a prior provisional permit, for a period of time determined by the City Council not exceeding sixty (60) days from date of the hearing. If at the end of the deferral period, the Building Official finds that there has been no substantial progress toward abatement of the defects, then such fact shall be reported to the City Manager who shall request the City Council to set a new hearing and proceed with an adjudication of whether the Structure is dangerous or not, in accordance with the procedures of the Amarillo Municipal Code Sec. 4-3-3 subsection (e).





If the Interested Persons of the dangerous structures shall fail, neglect or refuse to comply with this resolution as herein directed, then the Building Official is hereby directed to proceed with the demolition of the various dangerous structures and/or removal of any and all rubbish, trash, solid waste and unsanitary matters described in this resolution, and he may prosecute the Interested Persons as a violator of the provisions of the International Building Code and the Amarillo Municipal Code. SECTION 6. The Building Official is further directed to determine the cost of such demolition and/or removal and to levy such assessments against the real estate as may be provided by law. SECTION 7. That should any part of this resolution conflict with any other resolution, then such other resolution is repealed to the extent of the conflict with this resolution. SECTION 8. That should any word, phrase, or part of this resolution be found to be invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect any other word, phrase or part hereof and such shall be continue in effect. 

Chairman Parker opened the meeting, established a quorum and conducted the consideration of the following items in the order presented. David Soto gave the recommendation for the agenda item.

ITEM 1:

Approval of the minutes of the January 23, 2017 meeting

A motion to approve the minutes of the January 23, 2017 meeting was made by Commissioner Bedwell, seconded by Commissioner Jones, and carried unanimously.

ITEM 2:

Z-17-06 Rezoning of Block 36, Grandview Addition Unit No. 10, in Section 139, Block 2, AB&M Survey, Potter County, Texas, plus one-half of all bounding streets, alleys, and public ways to change from General Retail (GR) to Light Commercial (LC). (0.92 Acres) (Vicinity: Nelson St. & SE 27th Ave)

APPLICANT: Che Shadle

Mr. Soto advised the applicant is requesting the zoning change in order to develop the land with an outdoor car lot. The Neighborhood Unit Concept (NUC) follows zoning transitions from areas of lower density, commercial use at section corners, to areas of high density or residential uses located midsection. This zoning request is seeking a higher-intensity commercial use immediately adjacent to residential zoned lots and therefore, does not follow the NUC. Mr. Soto stated staff believes the request is out of character with the surrounding area and if approved, would negatively impact area residents. Mr. Soto stated staff believes is request is not appropriate and recommends denial as submitted.

Chairman Parker asked if anyone wanted to speak in favor of said request. Doug Saunders, 3222 S. Crockett, owner of proposed site, stated he feels Light Commercial zoning would enhance the neighborhood.

Commissioner Ford asked if the applicant plans to use the entire lot as a car lot. Mr. Saunders stated he is in the process of replatting the site into two lots, with the northern portion reserved for the car lot and the southern portion with possible expansion opportunities with Xcel's transformer station. Much discussion was held among the board members with possible scenarios for the proposed site.

Commissioner Ford asked the staff if a PD could be utilized instead in this case. Mr. Soto and Ms. Fawver explained that the Zoning Ordinance does limit when a PD can be utilized (for example, with a minimum acreage) and this property does not meet that standard. Further, a PD is a tool intended for a mix of uses or a type of use which is not already addressed by the pre-

defined categories within the Zoning Ordinance. That is not the case here. Lastly, the staff recommendation would be the same, as even a PD is analyzed against the four criteria presented in the staff presentation and summary.

Commissioner Ford asked what the options were for the Commission in this instance. Ms. Fawver explained that the Commission could approve the item as presented, deny it, or table it if they felt there was additional information necessary for their decision making. However, even replatting the lot into two would not change the staff's recommendation and assessment of the application.

Chairman Parker asked if anyone wanted to speak against said request. No comments were made.

A motion to table Z-17-06 was made by Commissioner Bedwell, seconded by Commissioner Ford, and carried unanimously.

ITEM 3:

Public Forum: Time is reserved for any citizen to comment on City zoning or planning concerns; however, the Commission can take no action on any issue raised.

No comments were made.

ITEM 4: Planning Director's Report.

Ms. Fawver advised she is coordinating a Planning & Zoning Commissioner's training session in the upcoming weeks. Items reviewed will include some of the high priority items from the Commissioner's survey, as well as including basic information about the Local Government Code, how zoning ordinances work, the utilization of the Comprehensive Plan, etc. The Planning Department is working on the preparation for another public meeting to discuss the Future Land Use and Character Map along Western St., with possible dates in March. Ms. Fawver stated the second neighborhood plan, the Barrio Neighborhood Plan, has begun with a possible kick-off meeting in the beginning weeks of March.

ITEM 5: Discuss Items for Future Agendas.

No further comments were made and the meeting was adjourned at 3:40 P.M.
