PURPOSE:

The AFD will utilize Rapid Intervention Teams (RIT) to provide immediate rescue to missing, lost, trapped, or injured firefighters.

GENERAL PROVISIONS:

- 1. A RIT shall be established at all offensive attack structure fires and other incidents where fire department members are subject to hazards that would be immediately dangerous to life and/or health.
- 2. A RIT will be established based on the AFD 2-in/2-out Guideline for Structural Firefighting (SOG 403.14).
- 3. A RIT is a fully equipped crew (minimum of two firefighters) with appropriate protective clothing, SCBAs, portable radio, and equipment based on the conditions and hazards of the incident.
- 4. The RIT will assume a ready state to immediately react and respond to rescue endangered firefighters. The RIT will be positioned by Command to maximize their effectiveness.
- 5. Multiple RIT's may be required for an incident depending on the size and complexity of the incident.

RIT ASSIGNMENT:

When a dedicated RIT has been assigned, they have the following responsibilities.

- 1. Refraining from other tactical functions. RIT's should be reserved for immediate deployment when firefighters become endangered.
- 2. Receive a briefing of incident conditions and locations of operating crews and continually monitor tactical radio channels.
- 3. Complete a survey of the involved structure or area to:
 - a. Determine access and egress points. Ladders may be required for elevated access or egress from the structure.
 - b. Determine specialized equipment that may be required for rescue operations
 - c. Determine fire and structural conditions that would hinder rescue operations
 - d. Identify protection systems and other factors that will aide rescue operations

- 4. Establish a dedicated tool drop area with appropriate equipment such as:
 - a. Air Supply for victim (RIT bag or SCBA)
 - Air supply should be operationally checked prior to RIT Deployment.
 - b. Portable radio for victim
 - c. Thermal Imager
 - d. Forcible entry tools
 - e. Portable hand lights
 - f. Guide rope
 - g. Specialized rescue equipment (i.e. power saws, hydraulic tools, webbing)
- 5. Identify and deploy a dedicated hoseline (with a separate water supply if practicable).
- 6. The RIT shall remain in readiness until the Incident Commander declares the incident under control and there is no longer an IDLH atmosphere.

RIT ACTIVATION:

The following guidelines will be used when the RIT is activated:

- 1. The RIT should be assigned a new designation, i.e. Rescue Sector.
- 2. Command will deploy the RIT to the last reported location of the company or the most effective access point.
- 3. Command will upgrade the incident to the next greater alarm.
- 4. Command will establish a new RIT to back up crews involved in the rescue operation.
- 5. Command will redirect other operating sectors to support RIT operations as necessary. Sector Officers will continue with previously assigned functions until reassigned by Command.
- 6. The RIT will operate using the Guidelines for Lost or Trapped Firefighters (SOG 304.06a).
