Planning Process and Schedule




EXISTING CONDITIONS MAPS AND DATA

- Demographics (population data)
 - Overall population, household size, race, age, median income
- Property Information
 - Owner-/renter-occupied, assessed values, market values, primary owners
- Land Use Data
 - Future land uses, zoning, vacant land
- Historic Information
 - Points of interest, catalog of significant properties, books, photos

EXISTING CONDITIONS MAPS AND DATA

- Crime Data
- Transportation Information
 - Transit accessibility, intersections of concern, pedestrian crashes
- Infrastructure Data
 - Utilities, sidewalk inventory, Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) projects
- Code Violations
 - Weeds, substandard housing, condemned buildings, junk vehicles



SWOT EXERCISE

- Strengths Things we LOVE about San Jacinto!
- Weaknesses San Jacinto's Disadvantages or Faults
- Opportunities Specific circumstances that make it possible to do something
- Threats Specific circumstances that could damage or endanger the neighborhood

• Historic characteristics (long-established neighborhood, Route 66, architecture)


• People (diverse population, service-/volunteeroriented, friendly)





SWOT EXERCISE - STRENGTHS

- Locally-owned businesses/restaurants (especially those along 6th Ave)
- Outdoor features (parks, open land, garden)
- Arts/music/entertainment



Planning Process: Analyze and Visualize **SWOT EXERCISE - WEAKNESSES AND THREATS**

Crime (drugs, human trafficking, theft)

- Infrastructure (decaying streets/alleys, missing sidewalks, outdated parks, lack of adequate lighting)
- Trash/debris/dead trees

- Neglected housing boarded up/substandard homes


 Food desert (no grocery store/little access to healthy, quality food)

CREATE A VISION AND GUIDING PRINCIPLES


- Create a Vision for the Future of San Jacinto

 - Built upon neighborhood strengths/opportunities
 - Provide foundation for future policies, projects and programs
- Develop Guiding Principles/Areas of Focus
 - Outline goals for future growth and development
 - Address a wide range of topics



Land Use Guiding Principles

Themes to be included in San Jacinto Plan:

- Discourage incompatible uses
- Plan for an diverse supply of housing for all income levels.
- Distinguish suitable areas for public uses.



Land Use Guiding Principles

Themes to be included in San Jacinto Plan:



- Diversify the types of businesses and create job opportunities.
- Promote areas of historical and cultural significance.
- Limit development in floodplains and environmentally sensitive areas.

Land Use Guiding Principles

Themes to be included in San Jacinto Plan:

- Promote redevelopment that is complimentary to the neighborhood.
- Increasing bicycle and pedestrian connections to key destinations.
- Consider public safety.

 Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN) is a federal program that "brings together federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement officials, prosecutors, and community leaders to identify the most pressing violent crime problems in a community and develop comprehensive solutions to address them."



- The foundations of the PSN strategy are:
 - Community-Based Local programs are designed to respond to the violent crime issues specific to that area.
 - Targeted The most violent offenders are identified and targeted through law enforcement, community intelligence and technology.
 - Comprehensive Enforcement are coupled with prevention and reentry strategies

 Target areas: North Heights and San Jacinto neighborhoods

• Goals:

- Reduce violent crime
- Have a lasting impact
- Engage the community
- Utilize data, innovation and collective resources (project partners) to achieve these goals



Amarillo Police Department - NPO Unit


 APD's NPO Unit – established approximately two (2) years ago



- We will encourage and support homeownership in the neighborhood to create a healthy balance of renters and homeowners.




Cleanliness and Safety:

Infrastructure:

- We will enhance our connectivity by creating sidewalks and "complete streets" that provide space for bicycles, public transit and automobiles while prioritizing pedestrians.
- We will improve our utilities and other infrastructure to encourage private investment in the neighborhood.

- We will connect our residents, businesses and other stakeholders with resources to improve the neighborhood.
